I was thinking of butterflies and how graceful and free they are. Freedom is what we are here for. There is something within every soul that yearns to be free. But, it takes us so long to realize that in order to be free, we must become aware of ourselves and we must grow. The butterfly knows this—that's why he gets to fly. When he is still a caterpillar, he doesn't know it. He just crawls around and munches on leaves, never really looking beyond the next leaf. He does what all caterpillars do because that's what he has been programmed to do. You and I also have our caterpillar stage. That is the time in our lives when we just go along with what is put in front of us because everyone else does and "they" say you have to fit this role and go into that slot. And we do it without question, totally unaware of our potential—which is freedom.

But, one day the caterpillar looks around and becomes aware. He sees the branch he is crawling on, and it looks small compared with the rest of the world. He sees the next leaf and, all of a sudden, something more. He sees that he is a caterpillar, but something in him says **he** is something more. He becomes uncomfortable with himself and where he is and, because it doesn't feel good to be a caterpillar anymore, the other caterpillars don't understand him. They tell him to keep eating—stay the way he is. But his awareness has brought with it the realization that it is time for him to change, time for him to grow. It hurts to leave old friends and old ways, but the pull within him is too strong to resist. It is some thing he knows he must do.

It is painful for a while as the business of growing sometimes is. And so he begins to surround himself with an outer protection so that those who don't understand can't poke at him. The more he spins his shell around him, the more he realizes that it is a time of aloneness, that this growing must be done all by himself, no matter how difficult it might seem. So, he isolates himself from the outside world. He goes within to a time of introspection and of retrospection. Oh, he knows there are support systems out there—they provide the branch he clings to; still, no one can get into the cocoon with him. We, too, have our support systems, but we must do our own growing.

Dear Friends,

I am often amazed at how one momentary awareness can become an educational experience—and lead to more awareness Earlier this week, while on the morning walk with my dog Blue, I noticed the dew on the grass and foliage along the way. What drew my attention to it was the light from afar shining on a blade of grass. It was almost as if its inner essence was showing on the outside. Why was I drawn to this?

I started thinking about dew. What causes it? Does it occur every day? That led me to the internet to do some learning. The National Geographic website states: "Dew is the moisture that forms as a result of condensation. Condensation is the process a material undergoes as it changes from a gas to a liquid. Dew is the result of water changing from a vapor to a liquid.

Dew forms as temperatures drop and objects cool down. If the object becomes cool enough, the air around the object will also cool. Colder air is less able to hold water vapor than warm air. This forces water vapor in the air around cooling objects to condense. When condensation happens, small water droplets form—dew."

As most of you know, sometimes a single word can lead my mind off into a stream of consciousness, finding something hidden in the word. Dew is one of those words. It reminded me of when we get angry—sometimes referred to as getting heated. During those times we are not able to do what we set out to do. We let anger evaporate our good. Anger becomes a blockage because it is not our nature, and at some level we know this. Like the moisture nurturing the grass as dew, when we cool off, our true nature returns, and we are able to nurture again. We experience our good flowing to us easily.


I have to confess I haven't finished reading this book. Usually 124 pages doesn't take very long, but consider some of the Chapter titles: (The following is just a sample.)

BASIC SOM QUESTIONS By Rev. Michael Laakso

We have an on-going column which is designed to answer some basic Science of Mind questions. We trust this will give you new insights, allowing you to better understand SOM principles.

What is Infinity? Part Thirty-Six

In our last article, we examined the Seven Days of creation as given in Genesis in the Bible. Those Seven Days or cycles of creation were the demonstrated Thought of the All-Good Universal Mind. Perfection, Harmony and Right Action characterized this cosmology. All cosmologies are internal cosmologies. Though Literalist consciousness interprets them as externally valid, Nineteenth Century Truth students knew to apply these stories to their inner experience, the esoteric side of Life. These stories/ cosmologies represent internal experiences of the soul mind that we all pass through, expressed symbolically and are meant to be helpful guides.



Our journey is one of return to our Origin. The Seven Day story depicts our beginning state in Spirit. All creation was declared by the All-Truthful as "Good and very Good." Wouldn't it be wonderful to feel this as the complete truth of our inner selves and our outer life experience today? This is our journey's destination—a return to this Home base consciousness. The next biblical story examines what happened on the inner level to obscure this eternal perfection of life from us as thinkers. As such, it also holds hints as to what is required for a complete return in consciousness to beholding this Perfection everywhere, always: our natural mind-state.

"When the Lord God made earth and heaven, there was neither shrub nor plant growing wild upon the earth, because the Lord God had sent no rain on the earth; nor was there any man to till the ground....Then the Lord God formed a man (adam) from the dust of the ground (adamah) and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life. Thus, the man became a living creature." As this story opens, we see differences from the earlier story. In the Seven-Day Creation, plants preceded human's presence; humans were the last creation. That story is recognized as the <u>spiritual</u> creation and follows a natural building up from primal states to more complex systems of life expression. Now we are considering our <u>earthly</u> introduction and tenure. We here are in a different environment from that of pure Spirit. In Spirit, it is all pure Thought, and obviously so. There we are mind experiencing Mind. Here we are demonstrating bodies and experiencing sensorially the demonstrations that make up our apparent environment. Mind is formless; as Mind's individuations, we are also formless. Infinite Mind knows no boundaries. Form is inherently bounded; it has an apparent surface and is apparently different from its surroundings. Here our adventure begins.

"The Lord God made trees spring from the ground, all trees pleasant to look at and good for food; and in the middle of the garden he set the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil....The Lord God took the man and put him in

the garden of Eden to till it and care for it. "We should note that the name of God has changed from the Seven-Day Creation story. There it was *"elohim."* "El" refers to Spirit and the suffix "him" pluralizes the word. This is similar to the Cayce readings' generic term often used for God: "the Creative Forces." Here the name for God becomes the Hebrew consonants YHWH, often pronounced Yahweh. Biblically, this name is often translated as Lord or Lord God. It shows a shift in emphasis in our relationship to Spirit. Nineteenth Century New Thought students saw this as a shift from direct experience of Spirit as when in Spirit to a less direct interaction by means of the Law, "like produces like." In physicality my thought demonstrates as the "Law of my Life." In this sense, my thought becomes my "Lord." So now we are dealing with our own thinking acted upon by the Law and the demonstrations automatically produced.

This is the creation of Eden, a perfect environment for this human in the earth plane. We are no longer purely spirit. Our body is created from the soil of the planet and our spiritual essentialness is "breathed" into this vehicle to operate through it. Air is an ancient symbol for spirit, the volitional, intending side of Mind. A oneness of spirit with our body is created for effective experiencing here in this earth plane. Eden is the place where all is provided easily, daily. New Thought students called it the "Edenic consciousness" – the awareness and trust that I am abundantly supplied for all my apparent needs. This is a reciprocal relationship. Something is needed from me for this "Eden demonstration" to keep functioning perfectly in the earth plane. Truth students saw that "tilling and caring for" this demonstration meant caring for my thinking to maintain the Edenic consciousness and therefore its demonstration.

The trees at the center of the Garden are opportunities at the Center of our being. As we will see, they represent potential choices we can make and the resulting consequences of those choices.

"[God] told the man. 'You may eat from every tree in the garden, but not from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil; for on the day that you eat from it, you will certainly die.""This quote seems to be usually read in a stern tone of voice. Instead, this may be more of a friendly warning spoken in a gentle, loving tone: "Don't eat from that tree; it won't be fun for you!" The question has arisen, why would the All-Knowing put this unpleasant potential experience in our perfect, safe place? My answer is that Infinite Mind is the Presence of All Possibilities, including the possibility of fooling ourselves. We are cautioned to not go there, that we won't like the



consequence. God cannot be less that the All-In-All. Its Own free choice was given us since we are created like Itself. This tree had to be included, due to God's Inclusive Nature and we must have choice about it.

Trees are a wonderful symbol for a "thinking system." Their roots are hidden in the ground, the subconscious. From that sprouts a trunk, a central idea that then branches out into that idea's expression in a myriad of ways, as each branch tip and its leaves. That main idea guides our perceiving. It is how I "touch" and understand my experience of my surroundings. Each branch tip represents a personal perception applied to a specific experience. These are countless perceivings I bring to my world as I go through a day.

The central idea of these two thought systems are in the name of the trees: "Life" and "Knowledge of good <u>and</u> evil." The tree of Life represents our potential of consciously realizing the "Life Divine," that is, the pure Mind Life of Source Mind. Actually that Life is always our life anyway. This tree implies we do not yet realize the full import of the Life that we are. We are sort of unconsciously living it without truly, deeply knowing it.

As for the other tree/thinking system, though the word "knowledge" is chosen by the translators, I suspect the original authors might have meant "perception" or "awareness." Personally, I reserve "Knowing" as a technical term for God's Mind state. Infinite Mind never guesses. It always knows and knows only Truth. Only Truth can be truly known. Anything other can only be believed-in. Note that the All-Good knows only Good and "knows" nothing of evil. If It knew of evil, evil would be a Truth. This is an inherent contradiction to the All-Good. And in God there are no contradictions, or God would not be at Peace. So "knowing" here is meant figuratively. This tree represents a thought system based on a fallacious premise; that evil is a reality.

If I adopt that thought system, I will inevitably perceive evil, badness, wrongdoing in my world. My viewpoint (that evil is "knowable") ensures this. This tree represents a delusional way of thinking, a fooling of my Self. Its main idea: there is a "real opposite" to every Good, Divine Quality. The Life tree declares a worldview of unity/nonduality; the other tree declares duality/divisiveness as its worldview. Let us continue.

"Then the Lord God said, 'It is not good for the man to be alone. I will provide a partner for him.' So God formed out of the earth all wild animals and all the birds of heaven. He brought them to the man to see what he would call them, and whatever the man called each living creature, that was its name...but for the man no partner had yet been found." This is the famous naming session. It has been pointed out that the act of naming something is to mentally carve out of Unity a specific, unique, "other" identity. This seems to be an inherent danger to our unity consciousness while here; that in materiality we may take each form as a separate identity, adulterating our mind's original oneness-realizing state. We lose seeing the One in and as all that we look upon. Naming is labeling and a label is far from the Whole picture.

And here is the consequence of this: "And so the Lord God put the man into a trance, and while he slept, he took one of his ribs and closed the flesh over the place. The Lord then built up the rib, which he had taken out of the man, into a woman. He brought her to the man, and the man said, 'Now this, at last – is bone of my bones, and flesh from my flesh! – this shall be called woman (ishshah) for from man (ish) was this taken.'....Now they were both naked, the man and his wife, but they had no feeling of shame towards one another." The Law puts the man into a trance, a consequence of his naming consciousness. There is no mention that he awakens. This implies Adam is now dreaming. He is caught in a self-imposed, self-replicating, mind-generated experience. Adam dreams that his inherent androgyny is split up into two separate bodies/beings. In the Seven-Day story, we are created male <u>and</u> female, not male <u>or</u> female. He has split from himself. His mind-confusion is well under way. But wait; there's more.

"The serpent was more crafty than any wild creature that the Lord God made. He said to the woman, 'Is it true that God has forbidden you to eat from any tree in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of any tree in the garden, except for the tree in the middle of the garden; God has forbidden us either to eat or to touch the fruit of that; if we do, we shall die.' The serpent said, 'Of course you will not die. God knows that as soon as you eat of it, your eyes will be opened and you will be like God knowing both good and evil.' When the woman saw that the fruit of the tree was good to eat, and that it was pleasing to the eye and tempting to contemplate, she took some and ate it. She also gave her husband some and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they discovered that they were naked; so they stitched fig-leaves together and made loincloths." Ironically, the sleeping Adam is promised he will awaken, but he falls into a deeper sleep. Their eyes "open" to shame, not love; to dis-acceptance or disowning of self. They perceive themselves as tarnished by (nonexistent) evil. The adventure is fully underway. God seems scary now.

Please note the acknowledgement of the serpent's craftiness. He gains the woman's trust by asking an obvious question. No doubt he knows the situation in the garden. Then, he subtly implies that the man and his wife are not now like God. We just read in the Seven-Day Creation story that humankind is created in the image and likeness of their Source. Have they forgotten? Or how could they buy this idea of *becoming* like God? (Jesus called this the Lie and the Father of Lies.) The woman contemplates the temptation. (The feminine is the receptive, so this idea must come through our receptive side.) Truth students knew that this is the start of a demonstration. She ingests the fruit and so the seed of this tree/thought system. We all know what seeds do; they sprout and grow. The woman and the man incorporated/internalized the tree's seed idea



and ensured its demonstration in their experience. This is a basic teaching in New Thought; that an embodied, deeply incorporated idea must demonstrate as experience.

"Everyone creates realities based on their own personal beliefs. These beliefs are so powerful that they can create [expansive or entrapping] realities over and over." ~*Kuan Yin*

In a world of peace and plenty, of health and wellbeing, of an inherent unity and nonduality of total Goodness, a <u>dualistic</u> <u>thinking system</u> is accepted by the residents and so their previous experience of self and life is completely interrupted. We all know the rest of the story. The Lord/Law escorts them out of their safe haven and into a world of struggle. Dwelling in a Universal Goodness, the only way to experience apartness from that all-pervading Reality is to blind our mind to it. We do this as indicated; by lying to our mind that there is other than All-Goodness. We contradict Good by making up and coming to actually believe in its opposite. This is dualism in the mind that is created by and is still one with Unity. I call this goofy thinking. Its consequences are not so fun.

Some read this story and see guilt as our problem and wrong-doing (that is, sin) as the root cause. The Truth student would see lies as our problem and ignorance of the Truth as the consequence. And what are lies but goofy thinking in the face of Limitless, Orderly, Truth-based Love?

So the Seven-Day creation story relates our reality; our true Identity, Reality and Context, all God/Good with no possibility of anything other. This story examines why we are not experiencing this Reality, though it is the only One there is. Also, it illustrates our way out. Knowing that the belief in evil is a false belief, our real problem is mental acceptance of falsehoods. The solution is Truth. Why else would Jesus tell us that we will know the Truth and the Truth will set us free? In fact, Jesus retells this story as the parable of the Prodigal Son. Note there is no shame or guilt-tripping in his version. He saw through to the Truth. Our problem is goofy thinking in the place of Truth thinking. But we each get to find this out for ourselves. Though the adventure is universal, it is also highly personalized. We are all thinkers for ourselves, so we deal with our own goofy thinking. This includes our agreement with the goofy thinking of others.

Duality includes all opposites. Denying Total Goodness, I claim evil as a part of me. I also deny Life and so claim death. I deny Power and so claim a victim identity. I deny Truth by claiming lies. For me this is the essential confusion. When I am confused between truth and falsehood, how can I function effectively? How can I intelligently choose? My mind is now equally valuing true <u>and</u> false. What a mental cul-de-sac! Truth students found their need to commit to and practice an inner conversation of Truth as their solution. Emma Curtis Hopkins uses this idea specifically in the first of her five spiritual affirmations: "My Good is my God. My God is Life, Love, Truth, Substance, Intelligence – omniscient, omnipotent, omnipresent." She directs our thought to affirming our always True Reference Point: Spirit. Why not have my thought – the Lord of my life experience – be the One Power, the All-Good Source of it all rather than something in contradiction to the All-Good?


Ultimately, this is a story of each soul-mind's experience who finds itself involved in this earth plane. Each of us named the animals and took the bite and identified ourselves as not like God. Each of us is retracing our steps back to the original error in thought to re-decide for ourselves who we are. We have fear and anger and shame to face along the way. We have tools to find/receive to help us on each next step. The Science of Mind is now such a tool for Truth students. No doubt we have gathered many to come this far. Our homecoming is inevitable, for all must tire of this foolish game and its internal consequences. Our Source knows us all to be living, moving and



having our being in the scope and safety of Its Living Love and Intelligence. Only some part of our mind denies what it is. The whole rest is still in communication, knowing our Source. The Real Unity is continually unfolding within the eternally awake aspect of our mind. Now we get to become fully aware of that, again. We can awaken from our dream of shame. The Voice of Love is ever our Guide. And so it is.
